Philippians 4:6-7 MSG

Mrs. Grant and Madame Jule

In 1844, Missouri belle Julia Dent met dazzling horseman Lieutenant Ulysses S Grant. Four years passed before their parents permitted them to wed, and the groom's abolitionist family refused to attend the ceremony.

Since childhood, Julia owned as a slave another Julia, known as Jule. Jule guarded her mistress's closely held twin secrets: She had perilously poor vision but was gifted with prophetic sight. So it was that Jule became Julia's eyes to the world.

And what a world it was, marked by gathering clouds of war. The Grants vowed never to be separated, but as Ulysses rose through the ranks—becoming general in chief of the Union Army—so did the stakes of their pact. During the war, Julia would travel, often in the company of Jule and the four Grant children, facing unreliable trans-

portation and certain danger to be at her husband's side.

Yet Julia and Jule saw two different wars. While Julia spoke out for women—Union and Confederate—she continued to hold Jule as a slave behind Union lines. Upon the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation, Jule claimed her freedom and rose to prominence as a businesswoman in her own right, taking the honorary title Madame. The two women's paths continued to cross throughout the Grants' White House years in Washington, DC, and later in New York City, the site of Grant's Tomb.

Health & Wellness Updates *From our Parish Nurse...*

January is glaucoma awareness month. Glaucoma is called, "the sneak thief of sight." Vision loss by glaucoma is caused by damage to the optic nerve. Increased eye pressure can damage the optic nerve. High eye pressure alone does not cause glaucoma. While eye pressure is important in glaucoma, it does not explain why glaucoma develops in all patients. The optic nerve is responsible for carrying images from the eye to the brain. The optic nerve acts like an electric cable with over a million wires. Researchers now view glaucoma as a disease of the brain, a neurodegenerative disease, rather than just an eye disease. The understanding of one key to glaucoma is in the connections within the retina and the brain. This ongoing research is leading to advances, and may well lead to new treatments and, possibly, a cure one day. A study shows that blindness ranks third (after cancer & heart disease) as people's major fear.

It is estimated that over three million Americans have glaucoma but only half know they have it. The majority of patients diagnosed with glaucoma have minimal symptoms, and once vision is lost from glaucoma, it's permanent. Vision loss begins with peripheral or side vision. One may compensate and not notice this, due to unconsciously turning one's head to see, until significant vision is lost. The good news is that glaucoma is treatable. This is why it is so very important to be tested throughout one's lifetime. Glaucoma is the leading cause of preventable blindness. We all need to raise awareness about the seriousness of regular eye exams. Glaucoma can affect people of all ages; however, the most common forms primarily affect middle-aged and the elderly. After cataracts, glaucoma is the leading cause of blindness among African Americans and people of African descent. It is six to eight times more common in African Americans than in Caucasians. A person is six times more likely to get glaucoma if one is over sixty years of age. A family history also increases the risk. The most common type is primary open-angle glaucoma. If a member of your immediate family has the disease, you are at a higher risk than the general population. Research also shows the risk for hispanic and latinos is greater than European ancestry and the risk also increases among hispanics over sixty. An eye health survey found that 76 percent of Hispanics did not know that their ethnicity is a factor for glaucoma. Another form of glaucoma known as acute angle closure has traditionally been more common in people of Asian decent. It is recommended that your eyes should be tested: before age 40, every two to four years; from 40 to 54, every one to three years; from 55 to 64, every one to two years; and after age 65, every six to twelve months. Anyone with high risk factors should be tested every year or two after age 35.

Tips to remember: 1.) Tell everyone on your health team, including all your doctors, that you have glaucoma. This will help them when prescribing medications, and be careful when using medications with cortisone. 2.) Report any changes to your doctor, especially eye irritation, watering, blurring, scratchiness, unusual discharge, temporarily cloudy vision, or rainbows around lights at night. 3.) When you go to see your doctor write down questions before you go, and write down your doctor's answers.

It is so very important not to neglect your vision and eye exams. If one would like to learn more about glaucoma, go to glaucoma.org for further reading.

Personal Needs Outreach through One Body Collaboratives

Court Street United Methodist Church has adopted February 20, 2016, to deliver items for people at Midvale Housing Development, 5410 Midvale, Rockford. It is not possible to buy personal needs products with food stamps. Thirty households receive a personal needs package each month and we have committed to doing February.

Our goal is to provide each household with the same items. We are collecting monetary contributions

through Sunday, February 7th. We are asking for volunteers to buy in bulk from a prepared list during the week of Feb. 8-12 the items we will place in each package. Then we are asking for volunteers to divide the items into packages during the week of Feb. 15-19 in preparation for distribution. Finally, we will need 2 to 5 volunteers to take the packages to Midvale on February 20th and distribute them.

Any contributions left over will be given to the Paper Angel closet.

How can you help?

Donate money so we may pur-

chase items in bulk. We will need a minimum of \$150 to cover the basics. The more money given, the more items we will include in each package.

Volunteer to purchase items in bulk with donated money. A list of needed purchases will be provided.
