²¹ When Enoch had lived 65 years, he became the father of Methuselah.²² After he became the father of Methuselah, Enoch **walked faithfully with God** 300 years and had other sons and daughters. ²³ Altogether, Enoch lived a total of 365 years. ²⁴ Enoch **walked faithfully with God**; then he was no more, because God took him away. **Genesis 5:21-24 NIV**

The above scripture brings to mind when I lived in Chicago and I would contemplate the walk home from school. The journey from school to home could be delightful or dreadful, depending on the diversity of persons and characters along the way. Therefore, you would try to walk with a friend or friends; the more friends, the safer. It was imperative that you walked with someone capable of aiding you, if needed, not just anyone. It was risky.

So when we read Genesis 5, the genealogy from Adam to Noah, it expounds upon the birth and death timeline of each patriarch. We can see a significant difference in the timeline of Enoch; because he **walked with God**, he was no more, because God took him away. The writer of Hebrews 11:5 (NIV) states it this way: *By faith Enoch was taken from this life, so that he did not experience death: "He could not be found, because God had taken him away." For before he was taken, he was commended as one who pleased God.* There was a distinction made in reference to Enoch: "taken," not death as all of the previous patriarchs.

We could conclude that journeying through life without God ends in death. In Genesis 6:5-6 we see evidence of death's grip: ⁵ *The LORD saw how great the wickedness of the human race had become on the earth, and that every inclination of the thoughts of the human heart was only evil all the time.* ⁶ *The Lord regretted that he had made human beings on the earth, and his heart was deeply troubled.* I believe all humans are seeking direction(s) in life and Enoch proved that divine direction is primary. **Walking with God** means keeping in step by following the Holy Spirit's directions. It also means we must be in agreement with God, this covenant is spelled out in scripture. Of course, Enoch **walked with God** in faith. Hebrews 11:6 states: ⁶ *And without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him.*

Therefore, **walking with God** along life's journey is the solution we need! ⁸ *He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to **walk humbly with your God.*** **Micah 6:8 NIV**

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Health & Wellness *From our Parish Nurse...*

There are facts and myths about concussions. Concussion awareness is on the rise as work progresses to understand the causes and effects. Here are some myths, misconceptions, and facts that we should all be aware of.

Myth: A concussion can only be caused by a direct blow to your head. A concussion is caused by rapid movement of the brain inside the skull. It can be caused by a blow to the head or by enough force applied to the chest, neck, or any other part of the body. Many people will think they are ok, but things like motor vehicle crashes, falls in the home, or being struck by an object can cause a concussion.

Myth: If you didn't lose consciousness, you didn't have a concussion. Only about 10% of concussions occur with a loss of consciousness. When there is a loss of consciousness, it is many times brief, lasting for just a moment. If someone has had a concussion, symptoms will begin to show within 24 hours of the injury. Symptoms can be subtle and written off as daily stress; however, a physical event could change how the brain functions.

Myth: All concussions are the same for everybody. Even if you've suffered a concussion before, the next one could have a completely different mechanism of action, symptoms may vary, and a different amount of time and type of treatment for recovery may be required. Every concussion is different/unique and most people recover within a few weeks after the injury,

with the first 10 days being the time of the greatest risk of repeat injury. Most signs and symptoms are evident soon after the traumatic event, while other symptoms may become evident days or weeks later.

Listed are the most common signs and symptoms: headaches or neck pain that do not go away, difficulty remembering, concentrating, or making decisions, slowness in thinking, speaking, acting, or reading, getting lost or easily confused, feeling tired all the time, having no energy or motivation, mood changes (feeling sad or angry for no reason), changes in sleep patterns (sleeping a lot more or difficulty sleeping), light-headedness, dizziness, or loss of balance, urge to vomit (nausea), increased sensitivity to light, sounds, distractions, blurred vision or eyes tire easily, loss of sense of smell or taste, ringing in the ears.

Children with a concussion can have the same symptoms as adults, but it can be harder for them to share how they feel. Call your child's doctor if they have had a blow to the head and you notice any of these concussion symptoms: Tiredness, or listlessness, irritability or crankiness (will not stop crying or cannot be consoled), changes in eating, changes in sleep patterns, changes in the way the child plays, changes in school, lack of interest, loss of a new skill, loss of balance or unsteady walking, or vomiting.

Sometimes adults and children complain of "just not feeling like themselves." Seek medical help.

Myth: Helmets can prevent

concussions. Helmets haven't been proven to prevent the internal motion of the brain inside the skull that causes concussions. However, equipment should fit properly, be worn at all times, meet manufacturers standards and be inspected each season for proper fit to prevent injuries that may complicate and prolong your recovery from a concussion.

Myth: Only athletes are at risk of concussions. Data from the Centers for Disease Control shows sport related activity is not the number one cause of concussions. For the younger and older age groups, it's falls within the home. For the ages in between, motor vehicle crashes, assault, and being struck by an object are the top causes. Many concussions tend to go unrecognized due to the fact that people don't think they could have suffered one.

Fact: If you show any signs of a concussion, you need to seek treatment. We don't yet have enough evidence to know what, when, and how bad the long-term effects of concussions might be. What we know for sure is that we all only have one brain. You don't want to risk permanent or irreversible damage.

OSF has a concussion clinic. The team treats pediatrics, adolescents, and adults. If you think you or a loved one has suffered a concussion, you can call the referral center at 877-464-6670 and schedule a concussion evaluation.

A Message from your Lay Members to Annual Conference...

HUMAN SEXUALITY & THE ONE CHURCH PLAN

During our July 29th worship service, you heard the report of the 2018 NIC Annual Conference meeting held the previous month. In the report, information was shared about the One Church Plan. As a reminder, or if you were not in attendance that Sunday, a part of the message spoke of Bishop Sally Dyck's Episcopal Address. Please refer to a brief summary of her Address, as follows:



Bishop Dyck spoke of the struggle, within the United Methodist Church, to reach a solution in regards to human sexuality. What we've learned about our impasse on human sexuality is that we all hold very divergent values or positions that lead us to our understanding of the solutions. Each of these positions is deeply grounded in each one of our systems of beliefs and values. Divergence recognizes that we're not going to agree, and so we must seek unity based on something greater than the agreement.

Our unity is based on Christ's mission for us. Learning how to live with that kind of unity, instead of agreement, is the biggest uncharted territory we face. But it is a skill that we need to learn, if we are going to live in love.

This past May, the Council of Bishops recommended the "One Church Plan" to the General Conference, which will meet in a Special Session in February 2019. Some highlights of the ONE CHURCH PLAN are:

- 1 Removes restrictive language about Homosexuality, but does not insure acceptance.*
- 2 Provides a generous unity that gives conference, churches, and clergy flexibility.*
- 3 Ends the threat of complaints and church trials.*
- 4 Clergy independently decide if they want to do same gender weddings.*
- 5 Local churches establish wedding policies which may or may not include same-gender weddings.*
- 6 No annual conference, bishop, congregation, or clergy is compelled to act contrary to their convictions.*

The Bishop stated "As the UMC, we continue to pray our way forward. " She encourages us to come together to be the hope for our communities and the world. The United Methodist Church is better together than split apart, divided in mission. We need to continue to grow in our faith, and to put our faith into action.

The Conference has scheduled General Conference Delegation Listening and Discussion Sessions. The Rockford District's session will be in Freeport on **October 6th**. If you are interested in learning more about the One Church Plan, and the future of The United Methodist Church, please plan to attend. This half-day session will begin at **9am at First UMC, 503 N. Lily Creek Road, Freeport, IL**.

When YAVO receives approval to become an after-school program, they will need volunteers for preparing snacks and tutoring.

One Body Collaboratives partners with local churches to match community resources with people of need, provides life planning, fills resource gaps, and coordinates volunteers. Also, One Body Collaboratives provides the management and organizational support for the Compassionate Impacts Project. This project will benefit our entire community, utilizing all of its assets and resources.

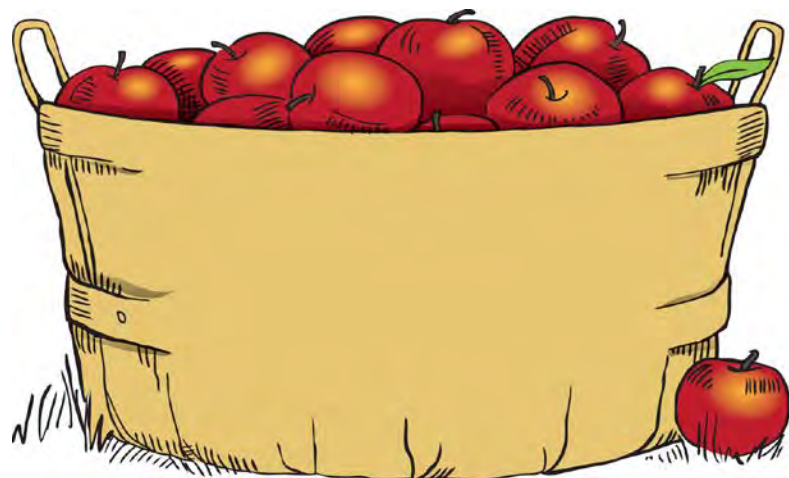
