<sup>7</sup> “Now, LORD my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David. But I am only a little child and do not know how to carry out my duties. <sup>8</sup> Your servant is here among the people you have chosen, a great people, too numerous to count or number. <sup>9</sup> So give your servant a discerning heart to govern your people and to distinguish between right and wrong. For who is able to govern this great people of yours?”

<sup>28</sup> When all Israel heard the verdict the king had given, they held the king in awe, because they saw that he had wisdom from God to administer justice. **1 Kings 3:7-9, 28 NIV**

In the first book of Kings, chapter three, King Solomon in a dream is asked by God; “Ask for whatever you want me to give you.” Solomon responds; “So give your servant a discerning heart to govern your people and to distinguish between right and wrong. For who is able to govern this great people of yours?” God, was delighted with Solomon’s response. And God said to him, “Because you have asked for this, **wisdom**, and didn’t ask for a long life, or riches, or the demise of your enemies, but you have asked for the ability to lead and govern well, I’ll give you what you’ve asked for—I’m giving you a wise and mature heart. As a bonus, I’m giving you both the wealth and glory you didn’t ask for. And if you stay on course, keeping your eye on the life-map and the God-signs as your father David did, I’ll also give you a long life.” <sup>1</sup>

We have many issues on a daily basis that we are confronted with, that demand answers or decisions. Complicated circumstances seemingly arise more often than we desire, and do not always have black and white biblical answers. In these situations, we have a need to access a reliable source of help. For Solomon, it was asking the only true source of **wisdom**, God. Wisdom that entails and surpasses all of life, comes from God. Wisdom takes us beyond the realm of mere right and wrong. Wisdom encompasses our personalities, our strengths, our weaknesses, and even our present state of being. Wisdom is often the tool God uses to personalize our lives to God’s will. A mentor, and fellow preacher, once said; “what we sometimes call common sense is kindred to Godly wisdom. The next time the complex issues of life arise, seek wisdom from the Source and Solution to all of life’s issues.

If any of you lack **wisdom**, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you. *James 1:5*

The fear of the LORD is the beginning of **wisdom**; all who follow his precepts have good understanding. To him belongs eternal praise. *Psalms 111:10*

To God belong **wisdom** and power; counsel and understanding are his. *Job 12:13*

God is the only source of true **wisdom**, and God promises to give it to anyone who asks for it. Wisdom begins with the fear of the Lord, and finds its fulfillment in love for others.

## Health & Wellness *From our Parish Nurse...*

June is National Safety Month. Including myself, many members of the church have grandchildren/great grandchildren who will be visiting them this summer. Child-proofing your home may need to be addressed once again. As the saying goes, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

What are the highest risk areas for injury and accidents in our homes? According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC), most accidents happen where there is water. The bathroom, kitchen, swimming pool, or hot tub are places where young children should never be left unattended.

Where there is heat or a flame such as in the kitchen, by the fireplace, or at an outside grill, is another high risk area. Be aware of toxic substances under the kitchen sink and in the laundry room (detergent pods) or where you may keep cleaning products.

Protect potential unsafe areas by using safety locks or protective knob covers when loved ones are visiting. Kitchen counter tops or easily reached cabinets without a safety device where you may keep your medications are another high risk area. In a purse where medications may be kept is often a place that is overlooked.

Keep coin batteries or “button

batteries” and any devices that contain them like hearing aid batteries out of the reach of children; they can be fatal if swallowed. A garage or garden shed is also a place to be checked for safety. Keep sharp tools and chemicals stored properly and out of reach.

Be aware of areas where falls can happen like stairs, slippery floors, high windows, or easily-tipped furniture. Use anchors to prevent furniture like TVs, ranges, or dressers from tipping over. One child is treated every 30 minutes for a TV related injury according to the American Academy of Pediatrics study.

Devices to keep loved ones safe:

1. Safety latches and locks for cabinets to help prevent poisonings and other injuries.
2. Outlet covers.
3. Corner and edge bumpers to help prevent injuries from falls against sharp edges on walls, furniture, and fireplaces.
4. Knob covers, which snap over door knobs, or door locks to prevent young children from opening doors.
5. Use cordless window coverings to prevent strangulation. Dangling pull cords or blinds that have an inner cord for raising the slats of the blind can be very hazardous.

6. Use smoke alarms on every level of your home and outside sleeping areas. Make sure to check them regularly (every month) and change the batteries yearly. Remember you can't smell smoke when you are sleeping.

7. Use a carbon monoxide (CO) alarm to prevent CO poisoning.

Be prepared:

1. Keep a watchful eye on infants and children at all times.
2. Learn first-aid including CPR.
3. Keep important phone numbers in an easy to find location.
4. Prepare and practice with your loved ones a fire escape plan and where to meet outside of your home.
5. Be prepared for tornados and have a plan in place.

In a compelling, richly researched novel that draws from thousands of letters and original sources, bestselling authors Stephanie Dray and Laura Kamoie tell the fascinating, untold story of Thomas Jefferson's eldest daughter, Martha "Patsy" Jefferson Randolph--a woman who kept the secrets of our most enigmatic founding father and shaped an American legacy.

Dear Congregation,

June marks the first anniversary of presenting information to you on Domestic Violence. Our mission has been to increase your awareness of the prevalence and seriousness of this problem. We began by putting flyers in the pews on "What Every Congregation Needs to know about Domestic Violence" for the 4-church worship service. If you missed seeing it, there are flyers in the rack outside of the office.



We have requested prayers for the victims of abuse and had speakers at both worship services in October during Domestic Violence Month. The Saturday morning United Methodist Men breakfast group began a Bible Study, "Amending through Faith." The congregation also viewed a video on child abuse called Stepping Stones. The committee and others have attended many community meetings and 2 fund raisers for Children's Safe Harbour, along with providing child care for the community task force when victims are meeting for guidance, volunteering at a community health fair and giving out information on how to seek help.

In addition, we asked you to discuss Domestic Violence with other church members, friends and family. We know these discussions may be uncomfortable but we cannot ignore this serious problem in our community, country and world.

Beginning the month of June, look for table tents in the Narthex to test your knowledge about Domestic Violence. We encourage you to have a conversation about these facts with your table partners.

Remember to continue to keep victims, and also abusers in your prayers. Lastly, please feel free to join our committee meetings at any time. Future announcements of meetings will be found in the bulletin and e-news .
